


Rostering 2019/20

Rostering for the 2019/20 school year is in its beginning phase. Parents wishing to bring to our attention any special needs or concerns about their child should put those concerns in writing and send them to the Rostering Committee **no later than Friday, April 5, 2019.** If you are the parents of twins and you would like them rostered in the same homeroom, please send in that request. **No rostering letters will be accepted after this date.** All letters will be handled confidentially by team members.

All information will be considered, and rostering will reflect what is in the best interest of the children within our diversified program. The intent for writing these letters is to inform the team about your child's needs, not to request a teacher by name.

Kindergarten Orientation/Registration

The Wyomissing Area School District will conduct its 2019-20 kindergarten orientation/registration on Wednesday, March 27, Thursday, March 28, and Friday, March 29 at the Wyomissing Hills Elementary Center. Orientation sessions will be conducted from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m., 11:00 to 12:00 p.m., and 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. A parent and eligible kindergarten child must attend <u>one</u> session.

Kindergarten has been learning about winter, its holidays and snow! We are enjoying reading books, completing art projects and other activities during the cold winter months.



We are practicing rhyming, writing meaningful sentences in KidWriting, hearing sounds in words and reading our high-frequency words. In math, kindergarten is learning about larger numbers, patterns, skip counting, odd and even numbers and more. February is a fun month in school and we are looking forward to celebrating and learning about the 100th day of school, Valentine's Day and President's Day!





Grade 1 News...

First grade students are ready for a Fantastic February! The shortest month of the year turns out to be one of the busiest on our calendar, as we will cover a wide range of topics.

We begin to explore weather facts and lore when the groundhog appears on February 2^{nd} . Our Math curriculum is enhanced by the One Hundredth day of school activities that will take place early in February~ exact date TBA. Chinese New Year is always a favorite winter topic in grade one. The Year of the Pig begins on February 5^{th} and the celebration lasts for a week. Children will learn what symbol they were born under and the special characteristics of their animal. Valentine parties will take place on Friday, February 15^{th} as children exchange cards and enjoy classroom activities.

Our (Reading Is Fundamental) program kicks off on February 19th with a visit from our favorite singer Tama McConnell! The children will sing along during her interactive performance and will choose the first of three books to take home, read and enjoy. Presidents' Day provides a time to explore the history of the U.S. Presidency, a study of our most notable past leaders (particularly Washington and Lincoln) and a chance to examine the significance of their lives and contributions.

Now that first graders are readers and writers all of these very interesting units of study take on a whole new meaning for them as learners. February is an exciting part of our year for learning and fun!

Grade 2 News...



Second graders are looking forward to a fantastic February! Our students have been busy learning to research using PebbleGo.com. (PebbleGo is available online through a link on our WHEC library page.) Each second grader has been using research skills to find and gather information from the site.

After the research is completed, each child will organize the details into a well-written, non-fiction, paragraph consisting of a topic sentence, facts, and a closing sentence. The students will continue applying their research skills in the upcoming weeks to write biographies using a variety of different types of resources including books and informational videos.

Second graders are also preparing for our upcoming math units on time and money. Learning to tell time and count money are two very important "real world" skills for children to master.

You can easily reinforce these skills at home with simple tasks. Develop money skills by having your child sort and tell you the value of a small pile of coins. Reinforce time telling skills by simply having your child tell you the time on an analog clock. You will be amazed by the difference that this small amount of practice can make.



It is sure to be a fun, and fact-filled, February in second grade!

FEBRUARY FACT FRENZY

As third grade students approach the end of the 2nd Quarter, they have now moved through the portion of the Go Math series that introduces Multiplication and Division. As we continue to move into more difficult math concepts, it is very important that students master their addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division facts.

What is fact fluency and why is it important? We're glad you asked! Fact fluency refers to a student's ability to recall the basic facts in all four math operations quickly, accurately, and effortlessly. Math facts are the building blocks for all higher learning math concepts. A student's inability to recall basic facts significantly hinders their progress as future concepts are introduced. As a matter of fact, studies have shown that students experience less "math anxiety" overall when they have successfully mastered their basic facts. They are more successful, confident math learners!






Grade 4 News...

Electricity is in the air in grade four! Students are learning about static and current electricity while experimenting with balloons, batteries, bulbs, and wires. We will also be building circuits, testing materials to see if they are conductors or insulators, and discussing electrical safety. During this unit, fourth graders are sure to agree that science is electrifying!

In social studies, grade four students will travel back in time and learn about early settlers in the New World. They will recognize the hardships faced by settlers in Jamestown and the early colonies. Students will see how the settlers overcame obstacles to build prosperous colonies. Later in the year, students will learn about colonial life in the thirteen colonies.

Robot fever is rampant at the Wyomissing Hills Elementary Center! Students received their book, *The Wild Robot*, on January 14th (funded by WAEF) and ever since then have been discovering how Roz will use her instincts to move, communicate, and learn as she adapts to her new life on the island. 
Music Room




STEAM Explorations


